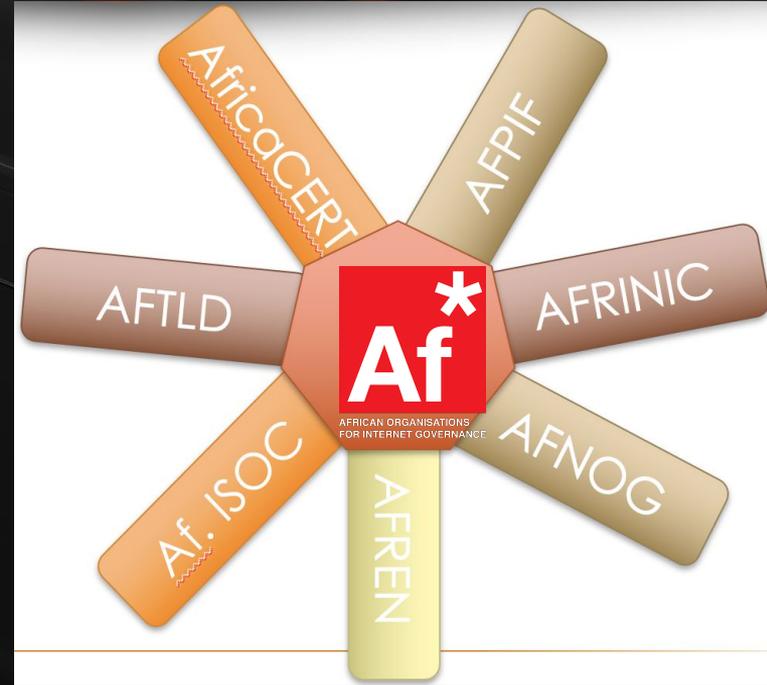

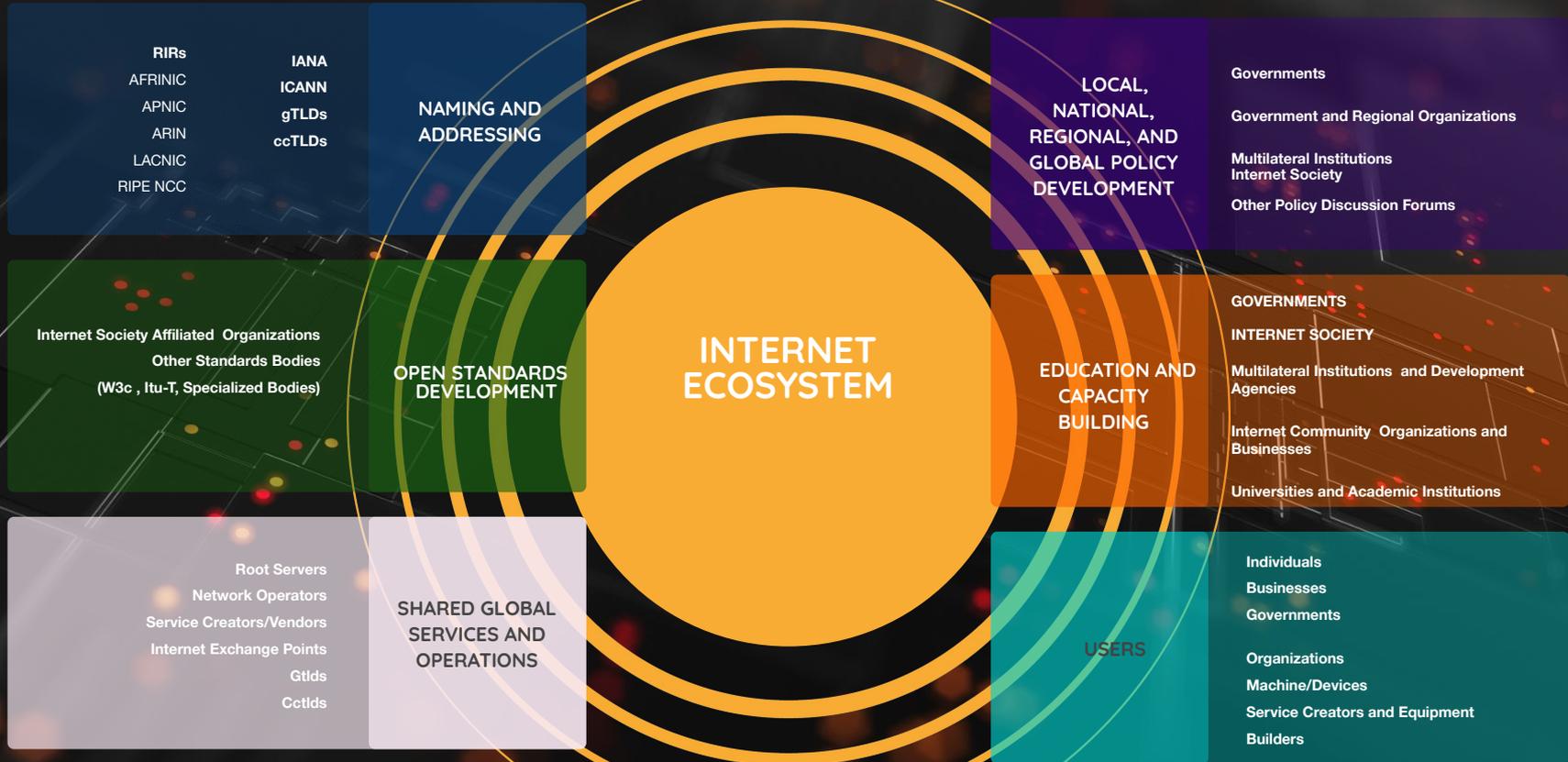


# Af\* Organisations

- Need for a registry to address IP number resources needs of the African continent
- Provide “proximity” service to African Local Operators and Internet Users
- Provide an environment to define Policies that are relevant to the African realities.
- Increase training and capacity building in the region on Internet IP technology and usage.
- Contribute to Internet affordability and accessibility.
- Facilitate the deployment of Internet critical infrastructures.

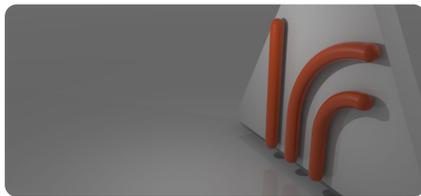

## IRR

### Internet Routing Registry

- Create Route(6) Objects, AS-SET, Route-set ...
- “route” objects ← link between ASN and IP block



## RPKI

### Resource Public Key Infrastructure

- Create Route Origin Authorisation (ROA)
- Revoke ROA
- Hosted Certificate Authority (CA)



## DNSSEC

### Domain Name System Security Extensions

Sign Domain Name System (DNS) data using digital signatures

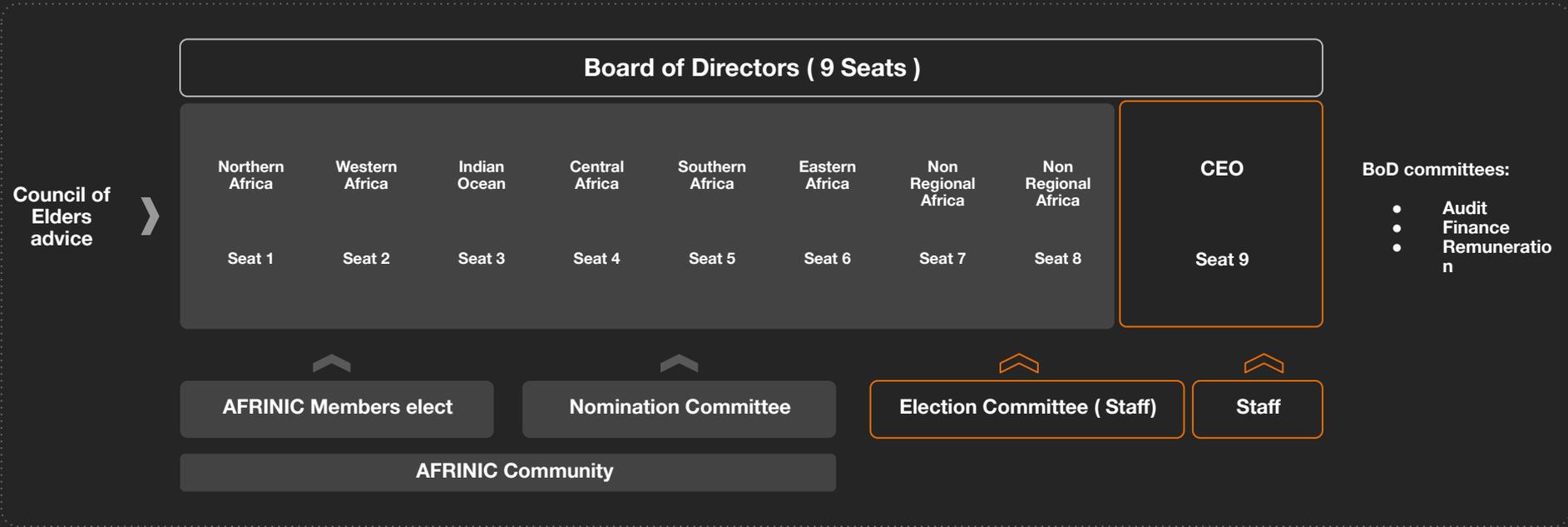

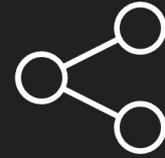

# Why should you care **about the PDP?**

**1. Influence over policy decisions:** RIR members shape policies on internet number resources by proposing, commenting, and voting through the Policy Development Process

**2. Transparency:** The PDP is designed to be an open and transparent process, allowing members to track the progress of policy proposals and understand how decisions are made.

**3. Adapting to changing technology and user needs:** The PDP allows RIRs to update policies to match evolving technology and user needs, incorporating new best practices and standards.

**4. Ensuring fair and equitable distribution of resources:** The PDP is essential for ensuring that Internet number resources are distributed fairly and equitably among RIR members, without preference or bias.

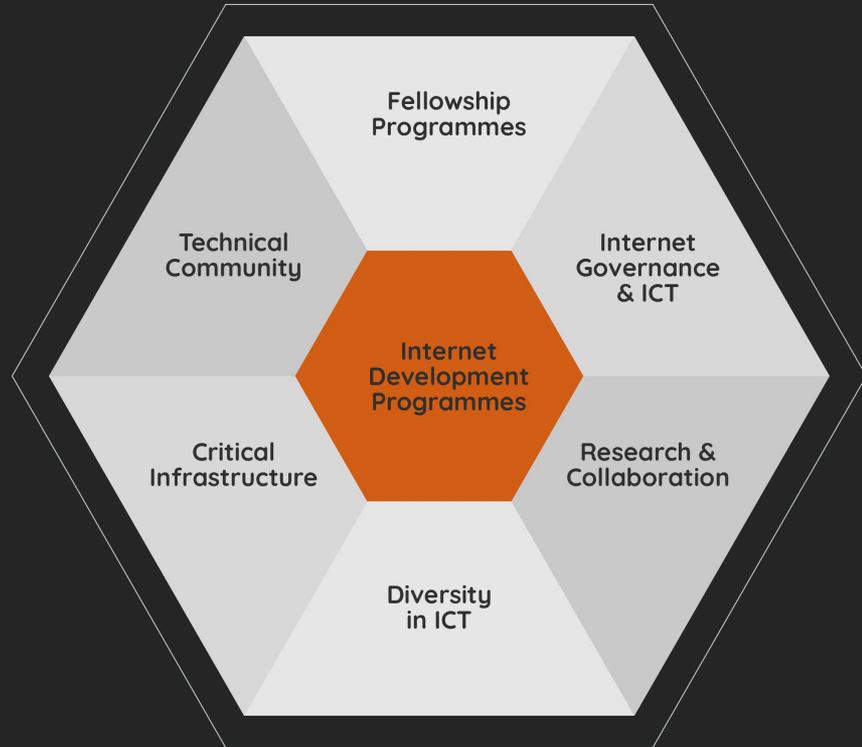

# 1.AFRINIC Fellowship Program

The AFRINIC Fellowship program creates a network of African ambassadors promoting our mission countrywide. It fosters potential leaders by offering citizens from various backgrounds the opportunity to participate in our policy meetings and initiatives. AFRINIC has granted 230 fellows from 50 African countries the opportunity to attend our meetings across the continent in the past 8 years.



## 2.AFRINIC Technical Community Development Program

Building technical communities is vital for advancing the Internet in Africa, as they ensure stability, security, and accessibility for all. AFRINIC partners with regional and national technical groups, including AfNOG, sdNOG, BurundiNOG, ZANOG, and more, providing resources to support their growth and skill development.



### 3.AFRINIC Internet Governance and ICT Initiatives Development Program

This program empowers Internet Governance African stakeholders to participate in global discussions. AFRINIC supports national and regional forums, fostering open and inclusive dialogue.

Over the past decade, AFRINIC participated in over 40 events, conducting workshops and sharing the AFRINIC Governance Model and IP distributions.



# 4. African Research Collaboration Program

AFRINIC partners with educational institutions to conduct technical and policy-based research in Africa, empowering network operators and end-users to make informed decisions in the unique African Internet landscape.

A collaboration with the University of Cape Town, South Africa, on the ARDA project, implemented with ISOC and AF-IX, is an example of such partnerships.



# 5.AFRINIC Critical Infrastructure Development Program

The AFRINIC program expands Internet infrastructure in Africa, by providing financial assistance and technical expertise for critical infrastructure like IXPs and DNS. This initiative aims to create a dependable, secure Internet for Africans and promote digital development.

We've supported Guinée-IXP, RINEX, and CIVIX and more others.



# The Diversity in ICT Program

Our Diversity Program bridges the digital divide and leverages everyone's potential to access, use Internet technologies by promoting and advocating for greater diversity and inclusion in ICT development across the continent.

AFRINIC partners with AfCHIX, RIFEN, Halley Movement, among others on that matter.
