Understand the why of resource policy

ICP-2 - Criteria for Establishment of New Regional Internet Registries

Bottom-up self-governance structure for setting local policies Procedure for development of resource management policies Open and transparent procedures accessible to all interested parties

Fair representation of all constituencies within the region

Annual policy development meeting and public archived mailing lists for policy discussions

AFRINIC Internet Number Resource Policies

Internet Number Resources Management Policies Guidelines for resource management and services offered by AFRINIC

Developed by the AFRINIC Internet Community (PDWG)

Developed through the AFRINIC Policy Development Process (PDP) Implemented if they reach consensus within the community and ratified by the AFRINIC Board

AFRINIC Internet Number Resource Policies

Applicable to organisations operating networks as Resource Members Applicable to organisations planning to obtain public IP Resources to connect users/customers to the Internet

Consolidated Policy Manual

AFRINIC Consolidated Policy Manual Repository of ratified and implemented policies Evolves to adapt to new situations and policy proposals

Policy Development Process Steps

Policy Development Process

AFRINIC PDP

Historical development and updates

2004 - Transitional Process 2007 - Update. Implemented in 2008 2010 - Update . Implemented in 2010

Current version is a documented policy (Section 3.0 of the CPM) Follows the bottom-up principle Policy and amendments require consensus within the community and ratification by the Board

Policy Development Process

Steps for proposing, deliberating, and adopting policies

Based on rough consensus

Each RIR has its own process with similarities & variations

Openness in policy development

Transparency through documentation and accessibility

Fairness in resource distribution

Policy Development Process -Key Steps



The Policy Development Working Group

Author a policy proposal

Discuss a policy proposal (agreements, merits, disadvantages, enhancements)

Online discussions (email address and mailing list subscription)

In-person discussions (Public Policy Meetings) May contribute in individual capacity or on behalf of their organisation(Resource Members)

The Policy Development Working Group

Chaired by 2 Co-Chairs selected by the community Current Co-Chairs: Vincent Ngundi (Kenya), Darwin Da Costa (Angola) Supported by AFRINIC's Policy Liaison Team Madhvi Gokool & Brice ABBA from AFRINIC

Conflict Resolution

In case of disagreement with the PDWG Chairs decisions, discuss with them

Use of appeal mechanism

Recall of PDWG Chairs

Roles of the PDP Co-Chairs

Moderate RPD mailing list discussions Determine rough consensus in public policy meetings Initiate and terminate final reviews of proposals

Report outcomes to the AFRINIC Board Publish minutes of public policy meetings

Building & Determining Consensus

Section 3.0 of the CPM

The objective of the PDP is to:

- Provide ample opportunity for participation and comment by all interested parties;
- Establish widespread Internet community consensus.

Section 3.4.2 of the CPM

 The Chair(s) determine(s) whether rough consensus has been achieved during the Public Policy Meeting.

Building & Determining Consensus

RFC 7282 (On Consensus and Humming in the IETF)

- RFC developed for the IETF, an environment similar to ours
- Provides a guide to building & determining consensus

Moderation of Policy Proposal Discussions

- Identifying objections & contentious issues regarding the policy proposal
- Tracking open issues yet to be addressed by the Author(s) and participants

Building Consensus

- Direct the PDWG towards the areas that are contentious
- Encourage participants to focus and seek consensus on such areas
- Ensure that concerns raised through the AfriNIC impact assessment are addressed

Building & Determining Consensus

- Determining consensus is a process
- Objective is to always aim for rough consensus, if not consensus
- Rough consensus is not built/determined through a VOTING mechanism
- Rather by ensuring that all objections/concerns are adequately addressed
- Look/seek consensus throughout the process (for each contentious issue)
- No VOTING mechanism applied at any point in time (avoid "vote stuffing")
- 100 people for and 5 people against might not be rough consensus
 If a minority of participants have a valid objection, that objection must be dealt
 with before rough consensus can be declared
- 5 people for and 100 people against might still be rough consensus As long as there are no valid objections that have not been addressed

Process of Building & Determining Consensus

Moderate Policy Proposal Discussions

- Identify objections/contentious issues
- Track open issues that are yet to be addressed

Build Consensus

- Direct PDWG towards open issues
- Encourage PDWG to focus & seek solutions to these issues
- Leverage on impact assessment to address open issues

Determine Consensus

- Focus is to ensure that all open issues have been addressed
- Looks/seek consensus throughout the process
- No voting (to avoid vote stuffing)
- 100 people for & 5 against might not be rough consensus
- 5 people for & 100 against might be rough consensus

Public Policy Meeting (PPM)

Annual meeting for policy proposal discussions

Authors present their proposals

AFRINIC staff presents impact assessment

PDWG members in attendance discuss proposals

Outcome: rough consensus or further discussion

AFRINIC systems (WHOIS, myafrinic, RPKI)

Once concluded, applies to all Resource Members and organisations requesting for resources

Resource Members may receive notifications of non-compliance Experience a change in behaviour when using the existing systems

Implementation

Timelines for implementation in the PDP Community is notified if additional time is required at the time of the impact assessment
